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The Cultivist's Top 12 International Hidden Art Gems

The women at the helm of the Cultivist, a members'-club-cum-concierge-service for art enthusiasts, are just the kind of people you would want to e-mail before taking a trip. They're well traveled, well connected and able to suggest places to visit that won't be glutted with tourists — as well as the secret spots tucked away in even the world's best-known museums. The club was formed to share that expertise; its founders, Marlies Verhoeven and Daisy Peat, previously launched Sotheby's Preferred program, and created the Cultivist to provide a similar service to a wider array of members: anyone who can spare \$2,500 and whose answers to the club's application questionnaire pass muster. (Admittedly, already a rather self-selecting pool.) Membership in the first year of the Cultivist's existence is limited to 1,000, and perks of membership include free, skip-the-line access to 70 museums — with three guests each — and over 30 art fairs, as well as a number of member events, worldwide. With the explicitly international scope of the project in mind, we asked Verhoeven and Peat, along with three of their colleagues in the Cultivist's programming and membership departments, to share a dozen favorite, farflung art destinations — that haven't yet been Instagrammed to death.



London - Leighton House Museum

"We recently held an event in the original home and studio of Pre-Raphaelite artist Frederic Leighton. Built for Leighton by the architect and designer George Aitchison, it is a <u>Grade II*</u> listed building and is noted for its elaborate Orientalist and aesthetic interiors. It is one of the only original artist studios of the area still intact and is so tucked away that it is barely known to even the locals." —Georgina Borthwick, director of programming for Europe

It includes a wonderful hotel that allows you to get fully immersed with the artists in residence. An ideal time to go would be surrounding Zona Maco, one of the more exciting art fairs in South America, in February 2016." —Joey Lico, director of programming for the Americas

In Var, a contemporary sculpture park, Domain du Muy, opened on July 13; up for six months, it's definitely worth a visit." —Marlies Verhoeven, founder
